### **North Korea Sanctions, Inducements, and Transitional Paths**

Poor, belligerent, and repressive, North Korea has confounded predictions of its collapse. Can the regime, now in the third generation of hereditary leadership, continue to manage the internal and external stresses that it confronts? What, if anything, can the outside world do to promote a trajectory that addresses the country's manifest humanitarian needs, and encourages less repressive internal practices and less fraught external relations?

**Marcus Noland** was a senior economist at Council of Economic Advisers in the Executive Office of the President of the United States. He is currently Executive Vice President and Director of Studies at the Peterson Institute for International Economics and a senior fellow at the East-West Center. Noland is the author of *Korea after Kim Jong-il* (2004), *Avoiding the Apocalypse: The Future of the Two Koreas* (2000), *Witness to Transformation: Refugee Insights into North Korea* (2011), and *Famine in North Korea: Markets, Aid, and Reform* (2007).

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
